What is a Civic Society?

There are some 750 or so Civic Societies throughout the UK with over 50 in the East Midlands Region.

Each Society's work varies from place to place, often determined by the needs within their local community, encouraging new developments to enhance the amenities and general prosperity of local communities.

- undertaking practical projects, developing new societies, finding solutions to traffic problems.
- input into local development plans, local area agreements, representing local residents on various strategic regional planning and housing forums.
- campaigning to improve local transport systems and better public transport.
- providing support to various small local improvement projects, such arts clubs, throughout the community.
- ensuring high standards in planning, architectural design and campaigning for the preservation of historic buildings.
- creating opportunities for local people to play a part in protecting their heritage as well as shaping the future of their community.

The role of the Dronfield Civic Society.

Dronfield has a long and interesting history, and it's important that we maintain our heritage whilst meeting the demands and challenges of today.

In Dronfield, the Civic Society is a non-political organisation which works with and supports many organisations in and around the town such as:

- The Dronfield in Bloom Committee
- The Old Dronfield Society
- Friends of Dronfield Station
- The Dronfield Horticultural Society
- The Lea Brook Valley Project

We work closely with these and other organisations and local authorities in developing and maintaining an attractive environment across the town.

Some recent examples of our work involve

- Supporting Friends of Dronfield Station in the re-establishment of regular, hourly rail services to Dronfield
 - Working with Derbyshire County Council in improving road safety issues across the town
 - Supporting Dronfield Junior School in its traffic management plans.
 - Upkeep and maintenance of the 'Heritage' ladles at the Dronfield town boundary
 - Promoting & supporting local businesses
